

NATIONAL MENTORING ACADEMY



The National Mentoring
Academy (NMA) is being piloted
throughout the church network,
providing an online mentoring
platform for volunteer mentors
to support millennials and

development of the younger generations.

In addition to mentoring, the NMA will also undertake projects of benefit to the community, churches or charitable organisations. Churchgoers will be encouraged to volunteer one hour a month as an Academy mentor. Phase I is planned to be rolled out across the church network in 2022, with subsequent phases to be extended to the wider community thereafter.

NCLF Director, Bishop Dr Joe Aldred, stated, "Mentoring features prominently in the recommendations made in our current manifesto. We therefore encourage church leaders to support the NMA initiative."

Shermara Fletcher (CTE) declares, "Mentoring is a powerful weapon the Church can deploy to redress the rise in social issues and underachievement in our communities."


The Killing of Dea-John Reid, 14

Dea-John Reid was a 14-year-old schoolboy from Kingstanding, Birmingham who was chased and stabbed in the chest and later died in May 2021.

The 15-year-old who stabbed Dea-John Reid was convicted in May 2022, not of his murder but of his manslaughter, and is expected to spend less than three years in custody. His four accomplices were also found not guilty of murder.

The family of the murdered teenager said the system is not "geared up to give Black people justice."

With many Black bystanders of other cases being prosecuted under joint enterprise, it beggars belief how the four accomplices have escaped the same treatment. For further info on this case, click here.

Windrush Day Grant Scheme: 35 projects across England, including a Windrush Choir, are being given a share of £500,000 funding to help commemorate **Windrush Day 2022** which takes place on Weds 22nd June. **Windrush Sunday** is on 26th June.

WHAT CAN I DO TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

This is the big question we should be asking ourselves.

Do I care enough to step up to the almost insurmountable challenge of engaging the increasing radicalism, injustice, and the associated heart-wrenching realities of terror, hatred, banditry and confusion inspired by religious bigotry?

The self-serving political pragmatism of the international community has once again responded in an almost deafening silence, while the ruling class in Nigeria has once again failed to protest and uphold the sanctity of human life. Deborah Samuel was brutally slaughtered in Sokoto State, Nigeria, accused of disrespecting Islam in a statement she posted on a WhatsApp chat.

As harrowing as this situation is, we must ask ourselves the difficult question: What would Jesus do, or, better still, what would Jesus

have me do? Does He want us to respond like a Stephen, who cried out for mercy and restorative justice as he was being stoned to death? Or should we be more proactive and challenge governments at home and abroad to rise up and do their jobs?

Can we possibly stand for truth and yet love our enemies, but protect our lives and property? Or are we too busy - or too traumatised - by the frequency of the carnage that we have given up every hope of making a difference?

It is deeply instructive that Stephen demonstrated such a high level of selflessness when he pleaded and interceded for the eternal well-being of his attackers, overlooking the injustice meted upon him by looking over to Jesus (Acts 7:58-60). Is this example relevant to the challenge we are facing today?
